### Verbal Periphrasis (3/2/18)

Verbal periphrasis is a fancy way to talk about combining a conjugated verb with another verb, such as a verb in the infinitive. Sometimes a Spanish periphrasis will include a preposition, such as "a" or "de".

English Examples: I want to run.

They should study. We tend to sleep in. You can see the stars.

Identifying conjugated verbs and infinitive verbs is important. For example, we have learned that direct and indirect object pronouns can go before a conjugated verb or attached to an infinitive, so we should understand how to identify these verb forms.

Below you will find many phrases that combine a conjugated verb with an infinitive, and you will recognize some. Notice that the English translation doesn't necessarily use an infinitive, even though all of the Spanish phrases do.

### **Verbal Periphrasis Examples:**

# Ir + a + infinitive = Going to do something

Yo voy a acampar.  $\rightarrow$  I am going to camp.

Vamos a cantar ahora.  $\rightarrow$  We are going to sing now.

#### Tener + que + infinitive = To have to do something

Tú tienes que ayudarme.  $\rightarrow$  You have to help me.

Ellas tienen que borrar la pizarra.  $\rightarrow$  They have to erase the board.

### Querer (e→ie) + infinitive = To want to do something

Él quiere manejar un coche nuevo. → He wants to drive a new car. Yo quiero saber más. → I want to know more.

#### Poder ( $o \rightarrow ue$ ) + infinitive = To be able to do something

Ella no puede oírnos.  $\rightarrow$  She cannot hear us. Usted puede nadar muy bien.  $\rightarrow$  You can swim very well.

# Acabar + de + infinitive = To have just done something

Acabo de terminar la prueba.  $\rightarrow$  I have just finished the quiz.

Empezar (e→ie) + a + infinitive = To begin/start to do something			
	El niño empieza a gritar. El ascensor empieza a funcionar.	$\rightarrow$ $\rightarrow$	The child begins to scream. The elevator starts to work.
Dejar + de + infinitive = To stop doing something			
	El ascensor deja de funcionar. Yo dejo de comer azúcar.	$\begin{array}{c} \rightarrow \\ \rightarrow \end{array}$	The elevator stops working. I stop eating sugar.
Estar + a punto de + infinitive = To be about to do something			
	Mi amigo está a punto de llorar. Yo estoy a punto de dormir.	$\rightarrow$ $\rightarrow$	My friend is about to cry. I am about to sleep.
Deber + infinitive = Something one must do			
	Debes cuidar a los niños. Debemos estudiar.	→ →	You must take care of the children. We must study.
